#### P.E. Kit – reminder

We are noticing a growing number of children coming to school without their P.E. kit, resulting in them being unable to take part in P.E. P.E. is a compulsory subject in all Scottish schools, and children receive 2 hours quality P.E. per week. A reminder that children should come to school with a suitable P.E. kit. This may include:

- Shorts/leggings
- T-shirt (school polo top/change of t-shirt for senior pupils)
- Training shoes (can be pupil indoor shoes)

As a means of reminder, P.E. days for all classes fall on:

Primary 1, Room 1: Tuesday and Friday
Primary 2, Room 2: Wednesday and Friday
Primary 3, Room 3: Monday and Wednesday
Primary 3/4, Room 4: Tuesday and Wednesday
Primary 4/5, Room 6: Tuesday and Thursday
Primary 5/6, Room 7: Wednesday and Thursday
Primary 6, Room 8: Monday and Thursday
Primary 7, Room 9: Tuesday and Wednesday



Additionally, children are not permitted to take part in P.E. wearing jewellery – specifically earrings. If earrings can be removed before school on P.E. days, or if you supply your child with micropore tape, this will enable them to take part in their P.E. lesson. Thank you for your continued support.

#### Attachment-informed practice at Hunter

Attachment and trauma have increasingly become a focus for education with the links between developmental trauma and attachment becoming widely known and understood. This has resulted in schools recognising how traumatic experiences can impact on a child's life and look towards alleviating the impact of trauma on learning.

One of the first steps in creating a trauma sensitive environment is becoming 'attachment-informed'. This means having a better understanding of how trauma can influence the way children relate to other people. Attachment theory describes how our earliest relationships, typically with our parents or caregivers, can shape the way we interact with others in later life. If a child experiences difficulties in these early relationships, they may struggle to build healthy connections later in life.

As a result, children who have faced challenges with attachment early in life may display distressed behaviour at school. A key aspect of attachment-informed, trauma sensitive practice is understanding that such behaviours are often rooted in adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) and cannot be resolved by disciplinary measures. What these children truly need are nurturing relationships that foster trust, support emotional growth and encourage healing.

Research on resilience—the ability to adapt and thrive in difficult situations—highlights the importance of feeling connected to others, providing a 'safe base' from which children can explore and learn. In many cases, having just one significant relationship where a child feels valued and cared for can make a remarkable difference in their life outcomes.

To support this approach, South Lanarkshire Council have provided a framework that includes key elements of an Attachment-Informed, Trauma Sensitive approach across their 6 Attachment Strategy Pledges. These are:

- See the whole person
- Hear their voice
- Recognise behaviour as communication
- Respond with compassion
- Act to make a difference
- Believe in change

As a school we have already achieved three pledged 'Act to make a difference', 'See the whole person' and 'Hear their voice' and are working towards our next pledge.

We are lucky to have a spare classroom again this year that has been transformed into a 'nurture' room. Small groups of children will work with Mrs McLaughlin in a variety of nurturing interventions that support our attachment informed practice.

What is nurture? The dictionary definition is 'to care for and protect someone or something while they grow and develop'.

The six principles of Nurture are:

- Children's learning is understood developmentally.
- The classroom offers a safe base.
- The importance of nurture for the development of wellbeing.
- Language is a vital means of communication.
- All behaviour is communication.
- The importance of transitions in children's lives.



These six principles are the building blocks of Nurture and something we are embedding across our school not just within a dedicated nurture space. All staff (Teaching, Support and Facilities) receive training and guidance around the Nurture principles and SLCs Attachment Strategy. The aim of this is to support our pupils so they can reach their full potential and raise attainment in our school. This all helps us in our goal of becoming an attachment informed, trauma sensitive establishment.

If you have any concerns about your child and feel they may be a candidate for Nurture, please do not hesitate to get in touch. It should be noted that attending nurture is not something that every child will receive. There is specific paperwork that must be completed in order for a child to attend dedicated Nurture sessions. Sometimes the most beneficial route is to put support measures in place within the classroom.
